New horizons open for the Computer Group as we start to use the Community Computer Suite at Stowupland High School for our monthly meetings. This means that instead of meetings organ-



ized around one computer and a projector, we now have some thirty computers with facilities for projection onto an interactive white board. The opportunities for teaching with hands on experience, rather than lecturing and demonstrating are tremendous. present we are feeling our way and the implications of our new resources are only just beginning to emerge. We are very dependent on a technician who is most willingly available during our sessions and provides hot drinks beforehand.

We are fortunate that the suite is free for us on the third Monday morning when we usually meet. This is not the only time when it is available however, and the teacher in charge is keen that it should be used by other community groups whether from the U3A or not. The school has specialist ICT status and financial grants are dependent on community involvement. So we are helping the school while we are helping ourselves. As far as we are concerned the facility is free. Other U3As are very envious of our good fortune. Our programme is flexible at the moment as we feel our way in this new situation. The opportunity for beginners to join us and have true hands on experience is open to all U3A members.



WHAT ARE YOU TO DO IF YOU HAVE A HEART ATTACK WHILE YOU ARE ALONE?

Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack, this article seems to be in order. The Johnson City Medical Centre staff actually did an in-depth study on this situation It is called cough CPR.

You are alone and suddenly you start experiencing severe pain in your chest that starts to radiate out into your arm and up into your jaw.

Without help, a person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness.

However, victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest.

A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again.

Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it regain normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get to a hospital. Tell as many other people as possible about this, it could save their lives!


