From the Chairman: -

This is my first Newsletter contribution following my election at the AGM and I'd like to start by thanking everyone for allowing me to take on this responsible role; I'll endeavour to live up to the standards set by my predecessors. I joined Stowmarket U3A in 2007 whilst Harold Turner was Chairman and was catapulted into the job of Secretary at that year's AGM. Harold was a well respected Chairman and it was quite obvious that he always had the interests of our U3A in everything he did. He was succeeded by Philip Weir and, as I did at the AGM, I'd like to pay tribute to his tireless contribution to the ongoing success of Stowmarket U3A over the years. He took over as Secretary in 2002 and continued for 5 years until handing over to me in 2007. He was elected Chairman in 2009 and at the 2012 AGM completed his 3 year term. During this 10 year period and in addition to taking over the editorship of the Newsletter, leading two groups and preparing the yearly programme for print, he has been involved in most of the outings and events arranged each year. He has also been a leading light in the development of the Suffolk and District Network of U3As. Truly the actions of someone who cares! On behalf of the rest of the Committee and membership at large, it was my pleasure to present him with a copy of 'The Lore of the land, a Guide to England's Legends'. Although he's retired from any official role, I'm sure that we will continue to enjoy the benefit of his contributions!

Your Committee made the decision early this year to try to bring some variety and interest into the AGM which heretofore had been perceived, quite rightly by some, as a rather dull event. To this end we held a combined AGM and 'Groups' day on 19th September which was structured so to provide the maximum social content for the members and visitors alike. As a consequence, we had our highest ever attendance at the AGM, about 80 which over lunch swelled to nearly 90. I'm pleased to say that 13 new members signed up on the day. Computer group :-

Since the last Newsletter we have had a varied series of discussions and presentations. In June our topic for the day was 'The



Right Click and the Windows Context Menu'. This is something to which we make a lot of reference at our meetings. But what exactly is it? Using a PowerPoint presentation we looked at many of the uses and the versatile nature of the right click. For future reference, members were given a Dropbox link to the full presentation.

Due to the school holidays the August meeting Shorter:was held at our old venue, the Woodfield Bowls Club. Very many thanks to Les Selby who travelled from Hadleigh to give us this audio/visual presentation. In his talk he covered a wide range of topics including the equipment that can be used, the connections necessary and the different sources of the original be they LPs, CDs or tape. It is important to note that whilst music tracks can be manipulated and edited to a degree, it is not possible to completely transform, say, an early 20th century recording in to current CD quality.

For September we looked at some more 'Computer and internet - hints and tips'. This fully interactive session was devoted to exploring a UK based help site, http://pcprop.com/w/hints-and-tips/. There are six sections, Keyboard, Pointer, Internet Browsing, Downloads, Windows 7 and General. Gardens and Things:-

March - Irene and Harold started the season with our first visit of the year to Otley college. It is some seven years since our last visit, and the college has made considerable



changes to both its lay out and the methods of teaching the pupils. The curriculum is open to all ages and is in the three stages of beginners (1st year) intermediates and qualification year.

April - The group followed Tony&Sandie Braidley on a trip to the Blakenham Woods near Claydon. On the way down a stop was made for a morning coffee at the water park situated on the old Bramford Road before moving onto the Woodland scene. The Wood is a private reserve on Lord Blakenham's land just behind Little Blakenham and caries a stock of both deciduous and evergreen trees along with all the wild plants such as Bluebells, Daffodils, Fritillary and many others.

May - The group gathered at Jenny Beeston's bungalow on the outskirts of Woolpit for a plant swap, and what an amazing day it turned out to be. Some twenty plus members of the group brought their surplus stock, which must have produced at least a hundred and fifty plants, vegetables, useful pots and other garden ornaments. The bonus of the day was the lovely setting of the bungalow with its ample grounds Play Reading Group:and parking and seating supported by the inevitable cup of tea. People were asked to donate for the plants that were taken and with the tea and plants contributions a sum of £48.50 was collected on the day. The

whole crowd set off and had lunch at the Bunbury Arms near Great Barton, and afterwards we made the way to the Antiques farm at Risby, a delightful building some 450 years old full of antiques and memorabilia; the group browsed there for at least an hour. Well done Jenny a great day out for us all.

June - We travelled beyond Woodbridge to visit Wantisham Farm. No need for our wellies because we were transported around the fields and through the woods seated in an enclosed trailer, pulled by a tractor, whilst the farm manager gave a running commentary and answered our questions. 
