- 1) UniBlue? What is it? Can I get rid of it?
 - Philip happy with it. Checks for unused processes and services that are using up valuable resources and invalid registry entries that accumulate over time. There is a free download to check for all these but if you wish to fix them, it's £19.99 for a year's license.
 - Problem in this case is possibly a partial download. Go to Add/remove programmes to remove it. Reinstall only if you wish. http://www.uniblue.com/software/speedupmypc
- 2) Windows 8 Very low take up so far?
 - Does not look as if it's going to be popular. Some people say wait for Win 9!

- 3) What's the best way to print a picture received by email?
 - If the picture has been sent as a very small size (say less than 100kb) and at low resolution it's not really suitable for printing
 - You should be able to get a reasonable 6x4 print with a file size of, say, 500+kb (modern cameras produce jpegs of 5-8Mb).
 - If the picture is of middling quality it can be significantly improved by selecting 'Best' on the printer settings.
 - This question prompted a lot of contributions about picture size and advice in general from around the table too many to detail here.
 - This is a topic we've covered in various forms at previous meetings but as we now have some new members I suggest we revisit it in the near future.
- 4) What's the correct way to get a picture from my scanner onto my computer?
 - Again, many contributions from around the table. Most scanners of whatever brand are supplied with software which makes the process straight forward. Please see http://tinyurl.com/scannerpanel for a screen shot of the Epson control panel. Further options are given as the scan proceeds.
 - As above, this will make an excellent topic for a future meeting.
