GROUP COORDINATOR'S REPORT

Let's Have A Moan Shall We?

I think we are very fortunate in our Stowmarket U3A with the amount of learning opportunities we have, at very small cost. I experience some irritation when I hear members having a moan about any small money increases for a series of lessons or room-hire or refreshments. When you compare our Stowmarket learning provision with other groups in Suffolk and around the country we are very fortunate. We may not be particularly inventive or original, but for our size we do wonderfully well – cheaply!

We have lots of people who give their time freely to coordinate and organise a variety of interest groups, often in their own homes. We have committee members and supporters who work hard for the cause (and then get moaned at because they haven't fulfilled some individual's expectations.)

Let's look at some issues here. The Membership Fee for Stowmarket U3A is £10. That buys us opportunities to belong to almost any group in our area. It also buys opportunities to attend monthly Wednesday afternoon meetings with speakers, news updates and social activities. For a few extra pence, tea and a biscuit can be had. In the groups, 30p is the recommended charge for coffee, tea and a chocolate digestive – try that at Costa! Hall-hire and tutors cost extra but from my evidence it is a bargain. Try getting language lessons or an exercise class for £2 to £3 pounds elsewhere. Trips are organised at relatively low costs. There is an opportunity for a Christmas Lunch at a bargain price. A Summer Garden Party is arranged at no cost (for the moment I suspect!) and the Buffet Lunch at the Annual General Meeting is subsidised for members. When we travel in other people's cars we are expected to make a minimal contribution to fuel costs. Perhaps we need to remember how much it costs to run a car with fuel at £1.40 a litre (have a look at your milk bottle for a comparison amount), insurance, tax and servicing and how good the people are who give us lifts, trolling round to ours to collect us.






Bridge for Beginners

Just to remind you we meet in the afternoon of the second Wednesday of each month at Stowupland High School. Recently, and mostly due to unavoidable reasons, attendance has been down at our meetings. This is unfortunate since we have had some very interesting and well received sessions since the last Newsletter..

In March I gave a presentation based on 'A behind the scenes look at www.u3astowmarket.org.uk, and an introduction to Wordpress'. In brief, we first explored the web site in detail and along the way I explained how were able to use our own web domain rather than purely the Wordpress default name.

We looked at some interesting statistics which showed that the number of 'hits' on the site has risen from 3,378 in 2008 to 11,555 in 2012 however about 49% of the hits per year were from people around the world searching for 'Scrabble' related pages, and an analysis of the remainder suggests that not enough of Peter Dakeyne peter@dakeyne.com 01449 781 562

our own members are making any regular use of the site. Encouraging, though, in the last 12 months some 73 people clicked through to the application form and many of these resulted in us gaining new members

Due to popular demand, in April (at the Woodfield Bowls Club), we revisited our topic from last October and looked at a new selection of members' favourite/most useful web sites. As before, this threw up some amazing examples of what's available on the web. If you follow the Computer Group links on the web site and look at the notes for the April meeting, you will find a full list there.

For our May meeting Clive Herrod gave us a most interesting insight into the 'Dragon Naturally Speaking' software. Whilst claiming to be a non-expert, he nevertheless gave an excellent demonstration of this most useful tool. He demonstrated 'speech to text' in Word. We were fascinated watching his words appear accurately as spoken. The software recognises commands such as 'stop', 'new paragraph', 'bullets' etc as opposed to speech, plus there is a useful microphone on/off/sleep function. This session inspired more than one person to go ahead and purchase the latest version!

Finally, in June, we looked at the latest version of Google's Picasa 3, the free photo organiser and editing tool. Having found out how to make use of its face recognition software we then experimented with the wide range of editing tools available. For people who want to exert some control over the final appearance of their photos but don't need the expense or complexity of Photoshop type software, this is the ideal choice.

Please note, it was agreed at the June meeting that we would take a break in August before restarting in September. Please have a think, and let me know, what you would like to learn more about in the new term and/or alternatively any topic that you would like to give a talk on yourself.

As always, we want to encourage beginners and the more experienced alike and to help this along all meetings start with 'Agony Corner' when members can raise any computer related issues or problems for discussion. There's usually somebody around the table who's had the same problem and solved it or, if not, some research is done later and the answers passed to everyone. If you are a new member of Stowmarket U3A and would like to learn more about computer related topics or indeed have experience or knowledge that you'd like to pass on, please let me know. If you go onto the Computer Group page on the website (above) click 'Groups' then 'Computer' and you will find links to notes for all meetings back to November 2010.

The group lead by Mike paid a first time visit for all of us to the museum of Moyes Hall in Bury St



Edmunds and given a conducted tour by their guide, this gave us a very clear vision of life in the early 1300s and the changes that had taken place over the Geology for the Curious centuries/ Maybe not the good old days, considering the conditions that people lived in. We were there for some two hours and on conclusion we moved on to the well known food at the cathedral refectory and sampled their great range of well cooked food. After a satisfying lunch we took a turn round the beautiful Cathedral gardens, a visit always worth while and never disappointing. Thanks Mike for a great day out. We gathered at the Solar car park at 9.30 and as a group of 18 made the half hour journey to Otley Hall. As this was again a first time visit we were surprised at the beautiful moated house that stood

still regal in its entirety. We were lead by a lady that knew her subject and told us of all the past history and how it had been altered both in use and structure since the 16th century, to its present day. We were moving about in the rooms that were still lived in by the present incumbents, and no house of this age worth its salt would be without its resident ghosted area, but we did not see it. The house is still lived in by the Beaumont family. We also did a tour of the gardens and was shown the interesting points by the head gardener, who had a vast knowledge of all the old herbs and plants.

It is a venue for quiet days and is mainly used by religious groups of all denominations, well suited for this kind of activity and the gardens are so tranquil and well laid out for getting away from all the bustle of present day stress. Another excellent day out for the group and so well planned by Janet.

A coach had been arranged by Angela to take us all to Capel Manor Gardens near Enfield in Essex. So it was an early start at 8.30 am , with every one there on time and the coach left as planned. It was a two hour journey, using the more scenic route down the A10 passing Duxford Air museum and arrived at 10.30, a nice time for a morning coffee.

Play Reading Group :-

The group has spent our last three sessions reading Twelfth Night hard work but very worthwhile. And in complete contrast we then read Alan Ayckbourn's Round and Round the Garden.



Round and Round the Garden focuses once again on middle-class angst: the characters' reluctance to talk about sex; their reluctance to contemplate unpleasant aspects of their loves; and their fondness

for banal chatter to cover up rather than express their Helen Barrett true feelings. Reg is locked in a sterile marriage to Sarah, but rather than trying to resolve it, he devotes Poetry Group: his energies to creating board-games that no one really wants to play. By contrast Norman tries to have his cake and eat it; not only remaining 'happily' married (in his view, at least) but also enjoying full licence to seduce other women at the same time. However Ayckbourn shows at the end of Round and Round the Garden how morally bankrupt Norman has become: to him women are nothing more than objects designed to prove that "this boy [i.e. Norman himself] can do no wrong." It's hardly surprising that everyone shuns him; this is what he deserves

Playwrights Study Group:-

We continue to choose a playwright whose work is to be produced

in the region in a few months time. We research and discuss various aspects of the playwright's life and how these have influenced the writing. We read extracts from these works and then attend a performance. Afterwards, we meet to discuss our many and varied views on the performance.

It is proving great fun and gives the brain cells a good workout.

We have discovered William Shakespeare through his Julius Caesar at The Theatre Royal Norwich and his Timon of Athens at the National Theatre Live broadcast to Cineworld at Bury St Edmunds.

Moving from the almost sublime to the somewhat ridiculous, we have delved into the life of Agatha Christie and discovered her knowledge of poisons from wartime days in a hospital pharmacy and her love of all things archaeological on digs with her second husband. We dabbled with popular culture and joined the ranks of those who share the secret of The Mousetrap. We gave it mixed reviews and wondered how it has survived for 60 years. No one was more surprised than Agatha herself at the public's acclaim for what she described as her stories.

Our next playwright, Bertolt Brecht, will be a challenge to us all. We will see his play The Good Person of Sichuan performed at The Mercury Theatre, Colchester, in October. It is described as "A great poetic parable of schizophrenia, true love and ambiguous morals".

U3A members certainly know how to have fun!

The Poetry Group has recently spent its twice-monthly sessions enjoying readings on the themes 'Moon, Night and Stars' and 'Water' and reading some translations of the Spanish



poet Garcia Lorca and also Gerard Manley Hopkins.

A group outing to the Sir John Mills Theatre in Ipswich was organised by our leader Sheila Dobey for the excellent 'Eastern Angles' play on John Clare. His poems are about nature and the countryside and how the enclosure of common land affected the livelihoods of peasant people.

Earlier this year we were again invited to give poetry readings to residents' social groups at both Partridge Court and Weston Court in the town. These readings are chosen and rehearsed by the group beforehand and were well received by the audience.

Plans for future meetings are to read the work of some women poets and to investigate the sonnet form
