

Computing and Technology

e've had two meetings since the last newsletter, April and June. Whilst there were only 6 or 7 in attendance at each we had much fun and chatter in amongst our more technical discussions.

Including matters arising from the previous meetings and new topics we discussed (amongst others)...

April: Revo Uninstaller, an excellent tool which does what it says on the tin and the various ways we keep the archive the Computer Group (as it was originally called) on our meetings on our web site page—back to 2011 would you believe!

We looked at several randomly selected notes of meetings and noted the various topics discussed, lead by members of the group.

In extracts from <u>Newsletter reports</u> we read that in the early to mid 2000s the group was very active, sometimes with as many as 30 regular members and tutorial sub groups lead by enthusiastic leaders.


Photography


e continue to have fun at our virtual meetings and our members are quite happy to continue this way for some time to come.

WALL HUGGERS SPOTTED HARLESTON!

Date: Tuesday 1st June

Time: Just after 2.00 PM

Weather: A warm, sunny afternoon.

They were spotted, hand lenses at the ready, scrutinising, discussing and attempting to identify the stones in Harleston church wall.



Snippets of overheard conversations: 'Look at the flints. So many different shapes and colours.'

'Yes, I can see the outlines of the crystals in this piece of quartz.'

'Is that a chert pebble? It's supposed to look like a ginger biscuit.'

'So many types of sandstone!'

AT 'This wall was restored in the 1860s'

'But there are various kinds of limestone too!'



'What's this? Ferricrete? Yes, it's a brown to black conglomerate of flint and fragments set in a rusty sandstone'

It's quite fascinating to hear that although flint is dominant, there are also quite a few other rocks in the wall. Did they come from local pits or quarries?

Keep your eyes peeled. The Wall Huggers will be out and about again. Possibly, the Abbey Gardens in Bury St Edmunds!

Fascinating Geology Facts

Did you know?

 Mountains are mostly underground.

You know how icebergs are mostly underwater? Mountains work the same way. They have roots that go deep into

the mantle. Scientists noticed this when they were measuring the gravity, and it wasn't what they predicted.

- Rubies, sapphires and emeralds are all more rare than diamonds.
- A mineral is a natural, non living substance. Examples include gold, silver, gypsum and quartz. Different combinations of minerals form different kinds of rock. Granite, for example, is composed of three minerals, quartz, feldspar and mica.
- A stalactite is an icicle-shaped formation that hangs from the ceiling of a cave. Some stalactites in France are nearly 30m long. To give an idea of the size of such stalactites, think of an old red coloured London bus. 30m is not one bus length, but 3 and 3/5 bus lengths!

How did we decide?


his event is unique in the history of our U3A in that is the first in which the membership were fully consulted and given all the options available for our first out door event following the relaxation of Covid restrictions.
