# July:

his month, a special event; we welcomed the renowned early music ensemble, Hexachordia.

Instead of a traditional speaker, we were treated to a captivating performance entitled 'Is that a Crumhorn...?', by Jane, Tony, and Sarah, who specialise in music from the Renaissance and early Baroque periods.

Hexachordia's presentation was a journey through the 16th and 17th centuries, offering a fascinating glimpse into the music and instruments of the time. Their dedication to historical authenticity was evident in both their performance and their insightful discussions. Using period instruments and singing, the trio brought the rich musical heritage of these eras to life,

in attendance.

The ensemble performed a selection of pieces, each introduced with explanations that provided context about the historical background and performance practices. These thoughtful insights added depth and understanding, enriching the audience's appreciation of the music.

n August, Peter Berry and Deb Bunt shared their personal journey of living with dementia, offering practical insights and wisdom.

Peter recounted his father's struggle with dementia, particularly his frequent requests for the time during daily car rides. Instead of becoming frustrated, Peter adapted by placing a clock on the dashboard, easing his father's anxiety. This simple act illustrated the broader message of their talk: the importance of meeting people with dementia in their reality rather than expecting them to conform.

One of Peter's favourite mantras is that 'life isn't over with dementia, it's just a little different' and he takes this positive approach with him wherever he goes. At the same time, he tries to leave his dementia monster (an ugly, Humpty Dumpty man with a pointy nose and a grumpy expression) on the settee at

home.

Peter and Deb emphasized patience, compassion, and adapting to the needs of those with dementia, advocating for these values through their book 'Slow Puncture' and their awareness work. Their talk, filled with hope and resilience, deeply moved the audience, showcasing how dignity, joy, and connection can be maintained despite a dementia diagnosis. Our members were encouraged to read the book and get more insight into their inspiring message.

# Deb Bunt blog on peter-berry.com

esterday we spoke to over 60 people from the Stowmarket branch of the u3a. Peter pulls no punches when it comes to explaining his condition, when it comes to telling his story and when it comes to saying what changes he would like to see around the diagnosis process. His honesty has always been a pivotal point in his talks

and the talk in Stowmarket was no exception.

For me, although I know much of what Peter is going to say, the trajectory of our talks is fascinating and unexpected and I always hear something fresh. I am forced to adapt my own responses and questions to accommodate his words. This is a good demonstration of how those around people living with dementia must adapt to suit their changes, and not the other way around. It also gives me pause for thought: as his journey changes, his emotions and views change and it's a real - and privileged - insight into his world.

Thanks to Keith from the u3a for organising our day, for his kind words and to all those who took the trouble to come and chat to us after the talk and, of course, to all those who bought our book and for persevering with the vagaries of my 'sum up' machine. Technology, eh!

### September:

Our u3a members gathered for the September Monthly Meeting at the URC, Stowmarket, which began with our **Annual General Meeting (AGM).** The AGM is a vital part of our organisation, where members can actively contribute to the running and decision-making of our u3a. We're pleased to report that this year's AGM had a strong turnout and successfully elected a new Committee (page 1) ensuring we remain buoyant for the coming year.

Following the AGM, we were treated to an outstanding talk by **Freya Levy**, a

para-athlete and advocate whose journey from

"Walking to Wheelchair" (follow the link) left a lasting impact on everyone in attendance.

Freya spoke candidly about her diagnosis with muscular dystrophy at the age of 14 and the challenges that followed as she transitioned from playing non-disabled sports to finding her place in the world of wheelchair athletics. Her passion and determination led her to represent Great Britain and England in several sports, including wheelchair basketball, rugby league, and para ice hockey.

Freya's talk focused not only on her remarkable sporting achievements but also on the importance of mental resilience, diversity, and the role that sport plays in empowering individuals. Members were moved by her reflections on how sport gave her confidence and a renewed sense of purpose after her diagnosis. Freya's story of overcoming adversity and finding new strengths deeply resonated with the audience, leaving everyone inspired to face their own challenges with the same determination.

It was a fantastic start to the new u3a year.

## From the Aviation Group

-Day Plus One, A Tragic Day for 34th Bomb Group

On June 7, 1944, just a day after the historic D-Day invasion, the 34th Bomb **Group at RAF Mendlesham** 

experienced a tragic and unexpected loss that left an indelible mark on its history. Known for never losing a single aircraft to enemy fighters over enemy territory, this day broke their streak in the most heart-breaking way. After a successful bombing mission over Tours, France, the formation of **B-24s** was shadowed by enemy aircraft on their return to base. As they neared RAF Mendlesham, they were ambushed by German JU-88 and Me-410 fighters from the Kampfgeschwader 51 'Edelweiss' Wing.

Four of the returning B-24 bombers were attacked and shot down as they prepared to land. The losses were staggering:

- Cookie's Wailing Wall from the 391st Bomb Squadron (BS) crash-landed at Eye Airfield, fortunately, without loss of life.
- Sweet Sioux from the 4th BS tragically crashed at Wetheringsett,

claiming the lives of three crew members. The navigator 2 Lt Grabowski one B-24 bomber safely landed at RAF and ball turret gunner, SSgt Johnson are buried at the American Cemetery in Cambridge.

- Wilson from the 391st BS crashed into the Personal Equipment Building at RAF Mendlesham killing seven of the crew with only one member managing to bail out. Four of the fallen were later laid to rest at the American Cemetery in Cambridge.
- Scotty from the 18th BS crashed in the vicinity of Nedging Tye near the 4th Strategic Air Depot. Witnesses Leonard and Clara Pryke, who lived nearby, saw the heart-breaking event unfold. The aircraft suffered fires in the No. 3 engine, on the flight deck and in the bomb bay, leaving the crew in a desperate situation. The pilot, unable to communicate with his team, set the plane into a climb giving himself and the As more Americans visit the UK to crew a chance to bail out. Tragically the ball gunner Sgt. Tipton and the tail gunner Sgt. Nowakowski bailed out too low and did not survive. The radio operator SSgt. Stygall was killed by enemy fire and went down with the aircraft. Sgts Nowakowski and Stygall are also buried at the American Cemetery in Cambridge.

Of all the aircraft in the formation, only Mendlesham that night. The remaining aircraft were diverted to other airfields as the attack unfolded.

Decades later, the memory of this tragic event continues to resonate with families and communities on both sides of the Atlantic. Mrs. Maggie Aggis, granddaughter of the Prykes carries the story of Scotty's loss as a family legacy. She hosted Adam Stensby, the grandson of Scotty's bombardier Lt. Donald McCarthy during his visit to the 34th Bomb Group Exhibition at the 'Middy' Railway Museum on October 9th. They then met Mr. Barry Lacey of Park Hall Farm to view the land on which RAF Mendlesham was located. After lunch they made their way to the crash site of Scotty, preserving the memory of those who sacrificed so much.

honour the service of their fathers and grandfathers, the courage and valour of the 34th Bomb Group remain an enduring testament to the bravery of the men who served. Their stories will not be forgotten

## **History Group**

e've enjoyed an eventful few months, with a series of fascinating talks and visits that have deepened our understanding of local and wartime history. Here's a summary of our recent activities and upcoming events:

In July, we were treated to an insightful talk by Don Mobley on the 34th Bomb **Group** (see p4), who served from the RAF Mendlesham airfield during World War II. Don's talk offered a vivid picture of the American servicemen stationed in Suffolk during this time, and it set the stage for a memorable outing to the Thorpe Abbotts Museum, in August.

This museum, dedicated to the 100th Bomb Group, provided a deeper exploration of the wartime experiences of US servicemen in the region. Members enjoyed a lovely picnic lunch together, which added a social element to our historical discovery.

Our next meeting featured a visit to the Great War Huts in Bury St Edmunds, a highly recommended site that brings the initially planned as a visit to Rougham era of the First World War to life. Members were given a guided tour, which included an introduction talk, visits to war huts, and a walk through the trenches, offering a unique and immersive experience.



It was a beautiful day and the group enjoyed a picnic on the grassy area beside the trenches in the shade. A great way to finish off our visit.
